THE BIG BOOK AND THE LITTLE BOOK

There are two books that point to God and reveal His power and character--the Big Book, which is the book of nature, and the Little Book called the Bible. Psalms 19 divides revelation into two main categories: General Revelation, which refers to the revelation of God in nature, and Special Revelation, which is the revelation of God in Scripture. The first of these is discussed in verses 1-6, the second in verses 7-11.

General Revelation is the term theologians most often use to refer to the revelation of God in nature, which is where Psalm 19 begins. "The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands" (New International). Here the psalmist is thinking of the stars, which are visible by night, and the sun, which he will introduce specifically in verses 4b-6.

His teaching is that the heavens, which contain these created objects, witness to the existence of their Creator. Even more than that, they witness to His "glory". The stars and the sun are so glorious that the One who made them must be more glorious still.

In the book of Romans, chapter 1:20, Paul says: "For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities—his eternal power and divine nature—have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made, so that men are without excuse" (New International). This is the meaning of the *glory* in Psalm 19. It is a revelation of God's existence and power, so great that it should lead every human being on the face of the earth to seek out God, to thank Him for bringing him or her into existence, and to worship Him.

This General Revelation is continuous, for the psalmist says of the heavens that "day after day they pour forth speech" and of the skies that "night after night they display knowledge" (verse 2). In other words, they are not an intermittent revelation, as if God were to send a prophet one year and then let many silent years go by before sending another. The skies reveal the glory of God every single night of the week, every week of the year, year after year, and they have done this since their creation. There has never been a moment in the history of the human race when the heavens are not testifying to us about God.

In the words of the psalm, "it pours forth speech" (verse 2). This is stronger in the Hebrew text than it appears to be in English, for the image is literally of a gushing spring that copiously pours forth the sweet, refreshing waters of revelation.

This is true in two ways. First, every individual part of nature testifies to its Creator, so that whatever part you happen to be looking at will pour forth knowledge. If you look at the stars, they testify to a God of great power who made them. If you study the human body, you will find that the body testifies to an all-wise Creator.

The petals of a flower, a blade of grass, a snowflake, the intricacies of the atom, the nature of light, physical laws like gravitational attraction and the second law of thermodynamics all testify abundantly to the divine mind that lies behind them.

The General Revelation is universal and can be known everywhere, so everyone in all the world has heard this "General Revelation." This is the basis for the universal ascription of guilt to humanity by Paul in Romans, chapter 1.

C. S. Lewis has rightly pointed out that the key line in this description is the last, which says that "nothing is hidden from (the sun's) heat" (verse 6). The line links the witness of the physical creation to the witness of the *Word*, for the Scriptures are likewise penetrating, warming, and life-giving, while also searching, testing, and purifying.

If we value nature, we should value the Bible even more, and equally important, we should make it the object of our most careful searching and devout, thankful, and obedient meditation every day.

In Ecuador we provide for an ill older sister who heard the message in Tampa many years ago.

Within the Good Samaritan Department we encourage donations to support new missionaries. We already have brethren in Miami, Orlando, Hayward, and Tampa who are paying the salaries of pastors and missionary workers in Uganda and Zambia. If you feel you are unable to do it alone, unite with other brothers and sisters to support someone who works to win souls for Jesus. We are sending \$50 a month for each worker so he will not encounter financial problems and may dedicate his time fully to the cause of truth.

There is a pastor in Zambia who has taken in orphans and we send \$100 a month to him. Another brother receives \$50 as a health worker. You will receive the names and addresses of your beneficiaries if you so desire. You may then correspond with them and pray that the work may be blessed.

In Tampa, some non-members also began cooperating when we asked for their help with orphans in Africa. Ask others and you will see how willingly they give for these causes.



Something to consider. . . Learning to Let Go

Researchers at Stanford University believed that forgiveness could improve health, and they sought 70 Bay Area Women to help them prove it. Specifically, they recruited women who were pre-menopausal, at least 18 years old, who felt stressed and "down" sometimes and who needed to forgive someone in order to let go of an issue. The researchers wanted to learn if women who were angry with others could learn to reduce the stress produced by such anger while also improving their health by forgiving the person who wronged them.

"When we are particularly angry about an event over a long period of time, there is often a psychological cost in terms of stress, hostility, strained relationships and so forth," said Samuel D. Standard, a research fellow in education. "But there is a physical cost as well. When we're especially agitated we produce cortisol, a hormone, which can help us rally and gain brief strength against a threat. However, an elevated level of cortisol for a prolonged period is implicated in several serious diseases, including diabetes, hypertension and cancer," he added. The purpose was to test a method developed by the Stanford team for letting go of the anger and experiencing true forgiveness in terms of psychological and physiological parameters.

This project was headed by Carl Thoreson, PhD.
